



BUDAPEST, HUNGARY -








A former imperial capital on the banks of the Danube, Vienna has long been a center of European art, music, and politics. Home to the powerful Habsburg dynasty and shaped by centuries of imperial reign, the city boasts grand baroque architecture, world-renowned museums, and a rich musical legacy.



Vienna was the creative backdrop for great composers like Mozart, Beethoven, and Strauss, and continues to shine as a cultural capital, blending classical elegance with vibrant modern life. Visitors can explore the opulent Schönbrunn Palace and the Hofburg Imperial Palace, once the seat of the Habsburgs, or marvel at St. Stephen's Cathedral in the heart of the Old Town. The MuseumsQuartier offers a dynamic mix of contemporary and historical art, while the Vienna State Opera remains a symbol of the city's enduring love for music. From the historic Ringstrasse boulevard lined with monumental buildings to the lively Naschmarkt filled with local flavors, Vienna offers an unforgettable blend of imperial grandeur and everyday charm.





KREMS, AUSTRIA


As your journey continues along the Danube, striking landmarks appear, including the majestic Melk Abbey—a Baroque masterpiece perched high above the river. Inside, visitors can marvel at intricate ceiling frescoes, a treasure-filled museum, and a grand library said to have inspired The Name of the Rose. For those seeking a more active perspective, the Danube Cycle Path offers a scenic ride from Melk to Krems through the Wachau Valley, a UNESCO World Heritage Site known for its terraced vineyards, riverside charm, and storybook villages like Weissenkirchen and Spitz. Whether by bike or boat, this stretch reveals some of Austria's most iconic cultural and natural sights. At the eastern edge of the valley lies Krems, one of the oldest cities along the Danube. With a history spanning over a thousand years, Krems enchants visitors with its UNESCO-listed Old Town, where Gothic churches, Baroque façades, and winding cobbled streets reflect its enduring legacy.

PASSAU, GERMANY SPIZ, AUSTRIA

Nestled along a gentle curve of the Danube, Spitz is a scenic riverside town with a legacy shaped by centuries of winemaking and river trade. Its terraced vineyards—most famously the Tausendeimerberg, or "Hill of a Thousand Buckets"—rise dramatically behind the town, offering a picturesque setting for its historic homes, quiet courtyards, and inviting wine taverns. Just steps from the river, visitors can explore medieval lanes, visit the Gothic-style parish church of St. Maurice, or hike to the ruins of Hinterhaus Castle for panoramic views of the Wachau Valley. With its relaxed pace, deep-rooted traditions, and stunning natural beauty, Spitz is a highlight for those seeking an authentic taste of Austria's cultural and culinary heartland.



LINZ, AUSTRIA -


Set along a scenic bend in the Danube, Linz is a city where history meets innovation. Once an industrial center, it's now a vibrant hub for art, technology, and culture. With landmarks like the Ars Electronica Center and a lively riverfront, Linz stands apart as a dynamic and creative destination on the Danube. The city also boasts striking modern architecture, interactive museums, and a thriving music scene. Major tours at this port include day trips to Salzburg, Austria, or the fairytale town of Český Krumlov in Czechia.

At the confluence of the Danube, Inn, and Ilz rivers, Passau is a picturesque Bavarian city known as the "City of Three Rivers." Its baroque Old Town, rebuilt by Italian architects after a great fire in the 17th century, features narrow cobbled streets, pastel-colored facades, and one of Europe's largest pipe organs housed in St. Stephen's Cathedral. With its hilltop fortress, riverside promenades, and vibrant café culture, Passau blends centuries of history with a lively university town atmosphere, making it a memorable stop along the Danube.





VILSHOFEN, GERMANY

Vilshofen an der Donau is the largest city in southeastern Bavaria, located in the district of Passau where the Vils River meets the Danube. With roots dating back to Roman times, it offers a peaceful introduction to the cultural and natural beauty of the region. Its charming Old Town features historic churches and traditional Bavarian architecture, all set against a scenic riverside backdrop. Just a short distance from Munich—the birthplace of Oktoberfest—Vilshofen offers a more intimate glimpse into Bavarian life, where local traditions, festivals, and flavors are proudly preserved.
